

CHAPTER – 17

EDUCATION

17.1 Education is the most critical element in empowering people with skills and knowledge and giving them access to productive employment in future. Towards this, expansion of educational facilities, improvement in quality of teaching and learning and improvement in access, coverage and retention ratios in schools are the major tasks on which the state government is concentrating.

17.2 Rajasthan has made substantial progress in education in recent years. Key-indicators of education have improved and the gap with national averages is reducing. While gross enrolment has exceeded 100%, Efforts are being made to reduce the dropout rate. Gender disparities in primary education are close to elimination.

17.3 Intense efforts have been made to improve teacher's training and strengthen technical expertise through training & professional development opportunities. The recruitment of Teachers Grade III was till now being done through the Rajasthan Public Service Commission (RPSC). However, keeping in view the fact that RPSC is pre-occupied with recruitments for a large number of other posts and the recruitment of teachers through the RPSC takes substantial time, the state government has taken a policy decision for recruitment of the teachers grade III through the Zila Parishads. Necessary amendment have already been made in the Rajasthan Panchayati Raj Act 1994 and the Rajasthan Panchayati Raj Rules, 1996. Now the recruitment of Teachers Grade III will be done district-wise by the concerned Zila Parishads. This will ensure timely filling up the vacancies of Teachers Grade III. To ensure their availability in all schools on the one hand, and to have a manageable teacher-pupil ratio on the other. Special efforts are being made to reduce the existing dropout rates especially for girl students. Special residential bridge courses have been started to enable dropout girls to join mainstream education. The efforts of strengthening mid-day meal scheme to provide hot meals, recruitment of primary & secondary teachers in large numbers, extension and provision of critical facilities in schools and hostels and training of teachers will make a marked difference in the quality and quantity of education.

17.4 State Government will initiate practical and effective steps to universalize primary education during the next five years. Recommendations of Sachhar Committee will be implemented in the field of Education. Role of private sector will be expanded in establishing high quality schools, colleges, universities, technical institutions and research institutes. An advisory council will be constituted for higher and technical education. Mid-day-meal scheme will be implemented effectively. Computer education will be promoted at school level.

17.5 Against an allocation of ₹ 3485.70 crores for the 11th Five Year Plan for Education Sector, ₹ 1461.94 crores were spent upto 2008-09 and ₹ 932.11 crores were spent during 2009-10. ₹ 1515.14 crores is likely to be spent during the year 2010-11. A sum of ₹ 1692.43 crores is proposed for the year 2011-12.

ELEMENTARY EDUCATION

17.6 Rajasthan's progress particularly in primary education has been impressive over the last decade. The state government has assigned top priority to increasing literacy rate particularly amongst women. There has been a remarkable rise in the number of primary and upper primary schools; the number of students enrolled as well as teachers teaching in these institutions. There are 50608 Primary Schools with 2.32 lakh teachers and 55509 Upper Primary Schools with 2.28 lakh teachers wherein total enrolment is 123.51 lakhs. During the year 2011-12 the figures of enrolment is targeted to reach up to 125.71 lakhs. The details of enrolment are as follows:-

17.7 To achieve the goal of cent percent enrolment and retention of children in the age-group of 6-14 years in schools, Child Tracking System has been introduced.

17.8 Against a provision of ₹ 2244.92 crores for the Eleventh Five Year Plan, ₹ 1130.43 crores were spent upto 2008-09 and ₹ 717.30 crores were spent during 2009-010. ₹ 1237.15 crores is likely to be spent during the year 2010-11 including TFC share of ₹ 287.00 crores. It is proposed to spend ₹ 1130.00 crores during the year 2011-12 including TFC share of ₹ 320.00 crores.

Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan

17.9 The Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan is Government of India's flagship programme for achievement of Universalisation of Elementary Education in a time bound manner. This programme was formally launched in the State in the year 2001-02 as a Centrally Sponsored Scheme. The main object of this project is to provide educational facility to all children of 6-11 age group in the State, to complete the primary education by 2007 and upper primary education by 2010 of all enrolled children and to

ensure universal stay of all children up to the year 2010. It also includes activities to bridge social, regional and gender gaps with the help of public participation in school management. This programme is being implemented in all the districts of the State. Under this programme, conversion of Education Guarantee Scheme into primary schools, upgrading primary school to upper primary school, repair and maintenance of primary & upper primary school buildings, training to teachers and the activities relating to quality improvement of the elementary education are being implemented.

17.10 During the year 2010-11, the funding pattern between the central and state government has been revised from 55:45 to 65:35. State share of ₹ 924.88 crores is likely to be spent during the year 2010-11 and ₹ 743.89 crores are proposed for the year 2011-12.

SECONDARY EDUCATION

17.11 Secondary education is a vital link between elementary and higher education in the educational system. This is a stage where the students are to be equipped for self-employment / employment. To meet this objective, the thrust under secondary education has been on computer education.

17.12 There are 12460 Secondary and 6675 Senior Secondary Schools in the State out of which 6241 Secondary and 3128 Senior Secondary Schools are in the government sector. A total of 28.13 lakh students are studying in these schools out of which 10.30 lakh are girls. For Providing easy access to the students passing out from the Upper Primary schools, the state Government Took a policy Decision for upgrading one of the existing Upper Primary Schools to the secondary level where there was no Secondary School with in the territorial jurisdiction of a Gram Panchayat. Accordingly, the State Government has upgraded 1900 Upper Primary Schools to the Secondary level. This will ensure that there is at least one Secondary School with in each Gram Panchayat in the State.

17.13 In order to ensure adequate enrolment and retention of children in government schools, free textbooks are being provided to all boys and girls of classes I to XII. For assessment of the performance of teacher, monitorable indicators have been introduced. State Institute of Education Management and Training (SIEMAT) has been established for imparting training to officials of education.

17.14 In the State, there are 2 Institute of Advance Studies Education (IASE), 9 College of Teacher's Education (CTEs), 32 DIETs, 787 teacher training colleges and 237 teacher training schools, which provide "pre" and "in service" training to the teacher and also provide facilities for research.

17.15 Against a total provision of ₹ 660.70 crores for the Eleventh Five Year Plan, a sum of ₹116.01 crores were spent upto 2008-09 and ₹127.77

crores were spent during 2009-10. ₹ 176.60 crores are likely to be spent during the year 2010-11. It is proposed to spend ₹ 418.87 crores during the year 2011-12 to meet the committed liabilities.

Expansion of Secondary Education under PPP

17.16 State Government has launched a scheme to encourage private sector participation for establishing new senior secondary schools in rural areas to achieve the goal of Universalisation of Secondary Education. Under this scheme, government will facilitate land and the private partner will construct and run the school. Half of total in-take capacity will be reserved for government-sponsored students. Government will issue the vouchers for these students.

Information & Communication Technology and Computer Education

17.17 To impart Information & Communication Training and Computer Education to students, a Centrally Sponsored Programme is being implemented in the State in the ratio of 75:25 between Central and State. This project was introduced in 2006-07 in the State. Upto 2010-11, 4670 schools were benefited in this project. ₹ 12.00 crores are likely to be spent during 2010-11 and a sum of ₹ 25.37 crores is proposed under state plan as state share for the year 2011-12.

Universalisation of Secondary Education (Rashtriya Madhyamik Shiksha Abhiyan (RMSA))

17.18 The Rashtriya Madhyamik Shiksha Abhiyan (RMSA) started from 2009-10 for Universalisation of Secondary Education by the Government of India. The funding pattern under this programme is 75:25. The main objectives of this programme are to universalise Secondary Education up to year 2015, to obtain the 75% target of class IX and X till the end of 11th Five year Plan, to boost the quality and expand the coverage of secondary education, to develop human and physical resources etc.

17.19 186 Blocks of Rajasthan state have been identified as educationally Backward Blocks (EBB). Girls Hostel scheme is launched to provide better residential facilities to the girls students of economically & social backward section of society. Construction of these hostels in 74 blocks is on full swing & likely to start these hostels by the July 2011. Sanction for 112 hostels have been issued by the government of India. Similarly sanction for 91 Model Schools also issued by Govt, of India, The Construction work for these hostels/Model schools will be completed in the 2011-12

17.20 A provision of ₹ 100.00 crores has been kept for state share in the year 2011-12.

UNIVERSITIES AND OTHER HIGHER EDUCATION

17.21 In the field of higher education, significant progress has been made in the State in recent years. The number of colleges in the state has

reached 1357 comprising of 127 Government Colleges, 9 SFS colleges, 1133 private colleges, 15 Law colleges, 70 aided colleges and 3 colleges under PPP mode. Out of the 127 government colleges 55 are post graduation level colleges. Out of total colleges, 34 govt. and 405 Pvt., Total 439 colleges are for Girls.

17.22 A Directorate of College Education, established in 1958, is responsible to run these colleges properly and for further extension of colleges. Six regional offices are functioning for the supervision and monitoring the activities of the colleges of their region.

17.23 At present, there are 15 State Universities, 9 deemed and 19 private Universities in the state including Agriculture University, Law University, Medical University, Ayurved University, Sanskrit University, Veterinary University & Technical University. In these institutions about 15 lakh students are enrolled.

17.24 Rajasthan today has one college for every 54,750 population, which is higher than the national average of one college for 77,000 population.

17.25 The concept of PPP has also been introduced in the field of higher education for establishment of new colleges, introduction of new subjects, establishment of knowledge centres, vocational courses and model colleges as centre of excellence and Science Faculty in Govt. Colleges. Youth Development Centres for career counseling have been established in 124 government colleges.

17.26 Against an allocation of ₹ 180.51 crores for the Eleventh Five Year Plan, ₹ 47.89 crores were spent upto 2008-09 and ₹ 20.63 crores were spent during the year 2009-10. ₹ 26.49 crores are likely to be spent during the year 2010-11. An amount of ₹ 32.00 crores is proposed for the year 2011-12.

Commissionerate of College Education

17.27 Against an outlay of ₹ 115.45 crores for the Eleventh Five Year Plan. Rs.36.65 crores were spent upto 2008-09 and ₹ 15.15 crores were spent during the year 2009-10. ₹ 20.29 crores are likely to be spent during the year 2010-11. An amount of ₹ 25.12 crores is proposed for the year 2011-12. Scheme-wise details are as under.

17.28 An amount of ₹ 1888.48 lakhs is proposed for the year 2011-12 to meet the committed liabilities of new subjects / colleges.

17.29 An amount of ₹ 305.58 lakhs is likely to be spent during the year 2010-11 and ₹ 97.15 lakhs are proposed for the year 2011-12 for improvement in existing colleges.

17.30 Centres for excellence have been established in 22 Govt. Colleges, It is proposed to provide ₹ 25.00 lakhs for the year 2011-12, for their functioning.

17.31 In the Universities & Colleges of the State, N.S.S is working for literacy, employment, AIDS awareness, eradication of social evils and shramdan. For this, an amount of ₹ 192.00 lakhs is proposed for the year 2011-12.

17.32 ₹ 70.00 lakhs is likely to be spent in scholarship during the year 2010-11 and ₹ 70.00 lakhs is also proposed for the year 2011-12.

17.33 An amount of ₹ 63.00 lakhs is likely to be spent during the year 2010-11 and ₹ 63.00 lakhs are proposed for the year 2011-12 for career counseling.

Universities

17.34 Against a provision of ₹ 65.06 crores for the 11th Five Year Plan for Universities, ₹ 11.24 crores were spent upto 2008-09 and ₹ 5.48 crores were spent during the year 2009-10. An amount of ₹ 6.20 crores is likely to be spent during 2010-11 and ₹ 6.88 crores is proposed for the year 2011-12 for Kota University, Bikaner University, National Law University Jodhpur and Sanskrit University.

LITERACY & CONTINUING EDUCATION

17.35 The Prime Minister launched Saakshar Bharat, a centrally sponsored scheme of Department of School Education and Literacy (DSEL), Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD), Government of India (GOI), on the International Literacy Day, 8th September, 2009. It aims to further promote and strengthen Adult Education, specially of women, by extending educational options to those adults who having lost the opportunity of access to formal education and crossed the standard age for receiving such education, now feel a need for learning of any type, including, literacy, basic education (equivalency to formal education), vocational education (skill development), physical and emotional development, practical arts, applied science, sports, and recreation.

17.36 Saakshar Bharat has been devised as the new variant of National literacy Mission. Saakshar Bharat will cover all adults in the age group of 15 and beyond though its primary focus will be on women. The scheme has not only been relieved of the shortcomings noted in its preceding editions, but also, several new features added to it. Basic Literacy, Post literacy and Continuing Education programmes, will now form a continuum, rather than sequential segments. Besides, the volunteer based mass campaign approach, provision has been made for alternative approaches to adult education. Jan Shiksha Kendras (Adult Education Centres) (AECs), will be set up to coordinate and manage all programmes, within their territorial jurisdiction. State Government, as against the districts in the earlier versions, and Panchyati Raj institutions, along with communities, will be valued stakeholders. Vigorous monitoring and evaluation systems will be installed. Last, but not the least, budgetary support has been enhanced substantially.

17.37 Saakshar Bharat has come into operation from 1-10-2009. With the launch of Saakshar Bharat, the National Literacy Mission and its entire programmes and activities stand concluded on 30.09.2009.

Objectives

17.38 The Mission has four broad objectives, namely:

- Impart functional literacy and numeracy to non-literate and non-numerate adults
- ii. Enable the neo-literate adults to continue their learning beyond basic literacy and acquire equivalency to formal educational system
- iii. Impart non and neo-literates relevant skill development programmes to improve their earning and living conditions
- Iv. Promote a learning society by providing opportunities to neo-literate adults for continuing education.

Progress under Saakshar Bharat in the State

17.39 The Saakshar Bharat Programme in the State of Rajasthan covers all the districts except Kota, where the female literacy rate is more than fifty percent.

17.40 The responsibility of implementation of this programme at District, Block and Gram Panchayat level has recently (on 2nd October, 2010) been entrusted to the Panchayati Raj Institutions of the State.

17.41 The State Government had established a State Literacy Mission Authority (SLMA) in the year 1988. In March, 2010, the constitution of SLMA has been modified in context of new scheme of "Saakshar Bharat".

Funding Pattern :

17.42 The share of funding between Central and State Government is in the ratio of 75:25. The total cost of project is Rs. 3339122446. The central and state share is Rs. 2504341835 & Rs. 834780611 respectively for the whole project period I.e. Upto March, 2012.

17.43 Released & Authorised Amount in the year 2010-11 :-Central share : Rs. 441059406 State share : Rs. 147019802

Progress :

- Two days orientation programme for Zila Pramukh, CEOs, & DLCEOs in Jaipur on 6-7 March, 2010 through IGPRS.
- General orientation to 1.25 lac PRI representatives and other officers done in the training programme of IGPRS.
- House hold survey completed in order to find out the number of non-literates in the State.
- State level committee (SLMA) constituted for implementation & monitoring of the project. The formation of committees at District &

Block level has also been completed. The constitution of Gram Panchayat level committees is still under progress.

- A few Basic Literacy Classes (1497) also started in 15 districts.
- For the orientation of Pradhans and Sarpanchs, BP & GP President Campaign also going on in the State.
- Training of KRPs and orientation of newly elected
- During the Annual Plan period 2010-11, approximately ₹ 90.00 lac has been spent.

Note :- The main reason for slow implementation of Saakshar Bharat Scheme in state has been the ongoing litigation of erstwhile Preraks causing hindrance in the process of engagement of one man and one woman as coordinators on 8873 Adult Education Centres at Gram Panchayat level.

17.44 ₹ 2.23 crores are likely to be spent during the year 2010-11. It is proposed to spend ₹ 34.13 crores during the year 2011-12 on Sakshar Bharat Mission.

Physical Education

17.45 The major activities relating to physical education are development of play field, strengthening / development of physical education of college and primary and secondary educational institutions, Yoga training programme and purchase of sports material. A provision of ₹ 15.00 lakhs is proposed for the year 2011-12.

Sanskrit Education

17.46 At present there are 10 Acharya and 18 shastri colleges besides 117 varishtha upadhyaya, 63 praveshikas, 1286 upper primary schools and 10 primary schools are functioning.

17.47 Against a provision of ₹ 17.50 crores for 11th Five Year Plan, ₹ 124.62 lakhs were spent upto 2008-09 and ₹ 74.95 lakhs were spent during the year 2009-10. ₹ 90.00 lakhs is likely to be spent during the year 2010-11. It is proposed to spend ₹ 112.00 lakhs during the year 2011-12.

ART AND CULTURE

17.48 Rajasthan is a land of colourful contrasts. Life has always been a challenge in this land of extreme geographical and climatic condition and people of the state have been living with a smile. Melodious songs, colourful dances and above all fairs and festivals celebrated around the year have been part of their life.

17.49 Rajasthan is known for its diversity & has a unique place on the world map of tourism in terms of natural resources, cultural heritage, historical as also Archaeological wonders.

17.50 To preserve and conserve this rich treasure is a monumental task. The state takes care of this heritage through various agencies. Against an outlay of ₹ 103.14 crores for the Eleventh Plan, ₹ 92.75 crores were spent upto 2009-10. ₹ 837.39 lakhs are likely to be spent during 2010-11. A sum of ₹ 1076.04 lakhs is proposed for the year 2011-12. Details are as under:-

Kathak Kendra

17.51 Kathak Kendra is a teaching institution of ancient and classical dance style, established to patronize and develop the Jaipur Gharana of Kathak. The major priority of the Kendra is to develop the research work, education and training and simultaneously to provide the stage for trained students and popularize kathak tastefully among the common audience and to publicise it. Rs. 8.50 lakhs are likely to be spent during 2010-11. ₹ 18.00 lakhs are proposed for the year 2011-12 for various activities.

Ravindra Rangmunch

17.52 ₹ 0.01 lakhs are likely to be spent during 2010-11. ₹ 36.88 lakhs are proposed for the year 2011-12 for computerization and website design and strengthening of building.

Assistance to Autonomous & Voluntary Organizations

17.53 The Department of Arts and Culture provides financial assistance as grant-in-aid to other autonomous and voluntary organizations, including individuals engaged in the development and preservation of fine arts. The object of the scheme is to preserve, protect and promote the cultural heritage of Rajasthan.

17.54 ₹ 10.00 lakhs are likely to be spent during 2010-11. ₹ 50.00 lakhs are proposed for the year 2011-12.

Archaeology and Museums

17.55 State has a vast array of cultural & heritage infrastructure. The Department of Archaeology and Museums is devoted to its most essential duties to explore, survey and to publicize the antiquities and cultural heritage scattered all over Rajasthan. The department is looking after 18 museums, 2 art galleries and 227 monuments and 46 ancients' sites.

17.56 The department is taking various steps for heritage conservation and development of these properties that specially focus on context specific development of heritage monuments & preservation of rare antiquities.

17.57 For conservation of heritage monuments in the state the role for individuals and business organizations has been created through Adopta-monument scheme (AAM), a state government initiative to solicit public-private participation for preservation of the State's rich heritage. Under the scheme architectural structures, forts, palaces, buildings,

have lies, heritage properties and landscape of high level archaeological, cultural or artistic value will be preserved scientifically. Private resources are attracted through PPPs and grant based funding from private foundations and persons. Heritage Protection and Promotion Board has also been setup to consolidate administrative and financial resources for protection and development of heritage properties.

17.58 Rajasthan State Museum Management and Development Society have been constituted for undertaking various works relating to up gradation, renovation and conservation of various museums in the State.

17.59 ₹ 150.02 lakhs are likely to be spent during 2010-11. ₹ 150.02 lakhs are proposed for the year 2011-12.

Archives

17.60 Rajasthan State Archives, Bikaner has been preserving documents of historical, administrative and economic importance. The Department is also imparting training for the up keeping and preservation of documents related to different departments, so that these could be used by the future generations.

17.61 ₹ 21.00 lakhs are likely to be spent during 2010-11. ₹ 37.00 lakhs are proposed for the year 2011-12.

Rajasthan Oriental Research Institute

17.62 The Rajasthan Oriental Research Institute, Jodhpur deals with the manuscripts on practically all the branches of Ideological studies. The institute has to its credit a huge collection of more than 1.23 lakhs manuscripts and more than 28,000 reference books and research periodicals. The manuscripts have been acquired by purchase, donation and some transferred from the museums of the erstwhile princely states. Thus the scope of research is not confined to Rajasthan only but covers the areas, which could be included in oriental history and culture.

17.63 ₹ 3.50 lakhs are likely to be spent during 2010-11. For the year 2011-12, ₹ 7.00 lakhs are proposed.

Arabic and Persian Research Institute

17.64 The Arabic and Persian Research Institute, Tonk is one of the prominent and premier institute of the country engaged in promotion and furtherance of Arabic, Persian studies. The institute has a rich source material in Arabic, Persian and Urdu languages.

17.65 ₹ 17.00 lakhs are likely to be spent during 2010-11. ₹ 46.00 lakhs are proposed for the year 2011-12.

Libraries

17.66 Against the provision of ₹ 70 lakhs for the Eleventh Plan, ₹ 33.30 lakhs were spent upto 2009-10. ₹ 18.00 lakhs are likely to be spent during 2010-11. ₹ 25.00 lakhs is proposed for the year 2011-12.

Academies

17.67 Against the provision of ₹ 1071.50 lakhs for the Eleventh Plan, ₹ 365.46 lakhs were spent upto 2009-10. ₹ 483.36 lakhs are likely to be spent during 2010-11. An amount of ₹ 442.36 lakhs is proposed for various academies for the year 2011-12.

Jawahar Kala Kendra

17.68 The Jawahar Kala Kendra was conceived in the year 1989, as an art institution of international excellence. With a focus on Rajasthan and national and inter-national perspective, its chief aim and objective is to promote all the arts, including visual and performing arts in all their forms and expressions.

17.69 It also endeavors to look into the dying traditional art forms and revive them keeping in view the needs of society and for fulfillment of the desired aims the Kendra associates artists, intellectuals, art-lovers and people in its various activities, programmes and policies.

17.70 The JKK will be developed as a multi-dimensional, multi-art activities centre. Presently, there are four divisions i.e. visual arts, theatre, music and dance and documentation division. State Government will develop this as Centre for Performing and Living Arts.

17.71 ₹ 100.00 lakhs are likely to be spent during 2010-11. ₹ 170 lakhs are proposed for the year 2011-12.

17.72 **Dr Ambedkar Peeth:-** ₹ 26.00 lakhs are likely to be spent during 2010-11. ₹ 31.22 lakhs are proposed for the year 2011-12 for committed items.

17.73 **Establishment of Kalbeliya School of Dance:-** To promote this folk dance, ₹ 62.56 lakhs are proposed for the year 2011-12 for completion of pending construction work.

TECHNICAL EDUCATION

17.74 With a view to ensure the availability of engineering hands and trained personnel, engineering education facilities, both degree and diploma level and craftsmen training, have been expanded in the State.

17.75 Against an outlay of ₹ 172.36 crores for the Eleventh Five Year Plan, ₹ 52.63 crores were spent upto 2008-09 and ₹ 19.02 crores were spent during the year 2009-10 And ₹ 55.91 crores are likely to be spent during the year 2010-11. It is proposed to spend ₹ 56.88 crores during the year 2011-12.

Directorate of Technical Education:

17.76 Technical education (Diploma courses) is a significant component of human resource development. The objective of technical education is to prepare technical manpower so as to meet the requirement of technicians at shop floor level in the industry. In Rajasthan, engineering diploma level

technical education is being imparted through 34 Govt. Polytechnic Colleges and 104 Private Polytechnic Colleges in 22 different branches (16 engineering and 6 non engineering). The total intake capacity of Polytechnic Colleges is 44810 seats.

17.77 The diploma level technical education has been expanding very fast in recent years. The State Government has made several policy announcements for encouraging private investment in technical education sector. With the result that as many as 36 new polytechnic colleges has been sanctioned under PPP mode out of which 29 polytechnic colleges are functional. During the year 2009-10, a government women polytechnic college has been sanctioned at Bharatpur at Divisional level now Women Polytechnic College is available at each Divisional Headquarter.

17.78 The Board of Technical Education has been entrusted with the responsibility of conducting examination of students of polytechnic colleges and awarding diploma certificates to the successful students. It is mandatory for all polytechnic colleges to get affiliation from the Board and follow the norms and standards prescribed by the Board. At present all polytechnic colleges are affiliated with the Board.

17.79 Against an amount of ₹ 111.00 crores for the Eleventh Five year Plan, ₹ 34.38 crores were spent upto 2008-09, ₹ 18.12 crores were spent during 2009-10 and ₹ 52.65 crores are likely to be spent during the year 2010-11. It is proposed to spend ₹ 48.08 crores during the year 2011-12.

Technical University and Engineering Colleges

17.80 Against an amount of ₹ 61.36 crores for the Eleventh Five Year Plan, ₹ 18.25 crores were spent upto 2008-09 and ₹ 0.90 crores is likely to be spent during the year 2009-10. ₹ 3.26 crores are likely to be spent during the year 2010-11 and ₹ 8.80 are proposed for the year 2011-12 for Rajasthan Technical University; Agriculture University, Udaipur; Engineering College, Ajmer, Bharatpur and Jhalawar.

Sports and Youth Welfare

17.81 State Government has constituted a Youth Board to accord priority to national level players in state services, strengthen the Sports Council, construct play grounds at Panchayat head quarters, constitute Rajiv Gandhi Youth Clubs, announce Sports Policy and implement it and establish national level sports schools on the pattern of NIS, Patiala.

17.82 The activities of Scouts and Guides, NCC, Rajasthan Sports Council and Department of Sports are covered under the head of Sports and Youth Welfare. Against an amount of ₹ 4348.00 lakhs for the Eleventh Plan, ₹ 2370.35 lakhs were spent upto the year 2009-10 and ₹ 710.00 lakhs are likely to be spent during 2010-11. A sum of ₹ 730.75 lakhs are proposed for the year 2011-12. Scheme-wise details are as under.

Scouts & Guides

17.83 The main objectives of Scouts & Guides activities is to include 5% of the student population, to contribute to the development of rural, urban, handicapped, orphan and tribal boys/girls/youths, to involve maximum possible non-student youths for preparing them as a good citizen and development of village and organisation of community development activities.

17.84 ₹ 10.00 lakhs are likely to be spent during 2010-11. ₹ 30.75 lakhs are proposed for the year 2011-12.

Rajasthan State Sports Council

17.85 Rajasthan State Sports Council is the apex body at the State level to look after the development of sports activities and to provide coaching to the players. The State Government has been providing grant-in-aid to the Council. ₹ 100.00 lakhs are likely to be spent during 2010-11. ₹ 200.00 lakhs are proposed for the year 2011-12.

Department of Sports

17.86 The Department of Sports is entrusted with the activities relating to promotion and development of sports and youth by providing grant-in-aid to various organizations and individuals. The activities being carried out by the department are development of playgrounds, awards to outstanding sportsmen, PYKKA, Youth activities, Rajeev Gandhi Clubs etc. ₹ 600.00 lakhs are likely to be spent during 2010-11. ₹ 500 lakhs is proposed for the year 2011-12 including 247.25 lakhs 25% state matching share for PYKKA (Panchayat Yuva Krida and Khel Abhiyan).
